What an exciting (and exceedingly hot!) day. "Best day ever!" Here's what we got up to...

Pond dipping! We found newts (lots of them!), diving beetles, dragonfly larvae and a water stick insect. We used a chart to help us identify what the creatures were before releasing them back into the pond. Only one of us fell in!

> We planted some seeds in a mixture of compost and pumice. The pumice, we learned, helps the soil to retain its water. We also planted out some basil plants. George suggested we use them to put on top of homemade pizzas!

We met a whole menagerie of animals: stick insects, ferrets, goats, birds, boa constrictors, corn snakes, rabbits, guinea pigs, giant snails, milk toads, bearded dragons (who we joined for lunch) and some rather unfortunate locusts (who were the lunch!). Everyone was very brave and lots of people overcame initial fears by approaching, touching or even holding the animals.

My favourite part was looking at the boa constrictor because it was longer than me!

I loved watching the tortoises as they moved super slowly because they had their house on their back. Soooo cute!

Historical Enquiry in Puffins

We became historians this week to try and answer the question:

Did the Vikings ever take over the country?

- First, we put placed a series of events in chronological order
- Next, we drew large axes (the graph type, not the weapon type!) on our tables using whiteboard pens
- Then we had to place the events we had ordered onto the axes considering how close each event showed that the Vikings were to taking over the country





The Vikings did not fully take over the country. We could see in the graph that, although in 871, 980 and 1016 they ruled parts of the land (particularly in the north), any other time they tried to attack they were paid off or defeated in battle.
