Paper Aeroplanes

Following our visit to the airport, we were desperate to fly our own planes. We did this through role play (fasten your seatbelts!) and by making our own planes out of paper.



We conducted a number of experiments with different designs to see which one flew the furthest. We recorded our measurements and talked about how to improve our planes as well as our throwing technique.



"I think, because mine is so symmetrical, it will fly a bit better." – Humphry

Some children even went on to design their own planes at home. Thank you, Chloe, for sharing your instructions with everyone. We also talked about the impact which the invention of flight has had on our lives and we looked at packaging to identify where different foods came from.

We then looked specifically at wheat and where it is grown as well as how bread is made. The children worked as hard as The Little Red Hen, grinding wheat grain to make some flour to turn into our very own bread rolls. Delicious!

While Year 5 answered the question 'Which soil has the most water?' ...

...and Year 6 selected their own experiments to describe the properties of different soils.





Using filtration techniques, pH testing, the hand method (rolling wet soil in your hand to make it into different shapes and making yourself rather muddy in the process!) and separating the grains of soil in water, the Puffins showed they are not afraid of a little dirt!

Ping Pong Reads Challenge

In addition to Reading Karate, after consultation with the children, we have decided to launch a new reading incentive scheme. This is a collective team effort which embodies the moral, 'many hands make light work'. The children are reading their socks off to earn their class a ping pong ball each week. Each class needs to earn 100 reads per week in order to get their ping pong ball. This only works if everyone in the class contributes; it is only possible to earn a maximum of 7 reads a week per pupil. Reads count in the same way as with reading karate:

- 4 pages and 3 follow up questions using a school reading book
- A whole book read to your child (the book must be one that your child could not read independently)

100 reads = a ping pong ball

2000 reads = 20 ping pong balls = 20 weeks = an awesome trip out for the whole class after Easter.

Please help the children achieve this goal and earn themselves an awesome trip in the Spring term.
