Word Time: territory

Choughs learned about the word 'territory'. We created our own panda territories and marked them. Male pandas mark their territories by:

* Rubbing their heads and bodies against trees to leave a scent which acts as a message to other pandas who live nearby. We used chalk to write messages to other pandas (e.g. 'I want a baby. Looking for love.' or 'Look out. Humans are coming by.')





* Rubbing a waxy scent gland (on their bottoms!) against things (we used wax crayons).



*Marking places with urine (lots of laughs). The males have a competition about who can wee the highest!



*Male pandas also leave poo as a message, and stamp about in it! Their poo is green as they eat mainly bamboo (which is not very nutritious so comes out looking very much like it did when it went in!). Green chalk did the job.

Some tips for helping reluctant readers, from our Paired Reading training:

Read to them! Let them fall in love with stories and lower the pressure. Include picture books about 'worries', 'making mistakes' etc. and en-



gage in 'book talk' about their feelings regarding learning to read and listen to their concerns.

Use books with picture-cues, or a high level of repetition/rhyming - these can be good for early/unconfident readers as they will become familiar with the sight of the key words and the objects/characters drawn. If a child is already familiar with a particular story, trace each word with your finger or encourage them to do them same, so that they are looking at the print when remembering the story.

Give your child options about when and where Paired Reading happens... at the



dinner table, in the garden, in a den, under-the-covers with a torch etc. Write a list of possibilities together!

Train-up extended family members or older children and encourage them to try-out Paired Reading with your child - some children may find this new and exciting, improving engagement.

Pneumatic and Hydraulic Systems

Puffins have begun a new unit of learning in DT focussing on hydraulic and pneumatic systems. This week, they investigated what each system was capable of moving and what the strengths and weaknesses of each were.

"Pneumatic systems use air to move parts."

"Hydraulic systems use liquids to move parts."

- "We could move our books and glue sticks easily with the syringe plungers and the hydraulic and pneumatic systems."
- "A weakness of the pneumatic system is that is uses air which is a gas. Because gasses can be compressed, some energy is wasted on this so the system is not as strong as a hydraulic one."
- "The hydraulic system could move a chair with its force but the pneumatic one couldn't."
- "When we worked together, and used 4 hydraulic systems, we were able to move the table!"
