## **New Class Names!**

A while ago we mentioned that following the restructure of year groups in classes next year we have decided to rename our classes to something a little more exciting than Class 1 and Class 2.

The children suggested different ideas and the names we have chosen are Cornish birds: Puffins and Choughs. We felt using these names would be good because they are birds that are special to Cornwall and can be found locally. They work hard to survive and we think this reflects how hard we work to achieve our best.

Class One will be known as **Choughs**, with our youngest children in Year One and Reception known as Choughlets!





Class Two will be known as Puffins.

Here are some interesting facts about each one.

# Choughs

- ⇒ their length is 39cm to 40cm
- ⇒ their wing span is 73cm to 90cm
- ⇒ their weight is 260g to 350g
- ⇒ the population is 250 to 350 pairs in great Britian and 120 to 150 pairs on the Isle of Man
- ⇒ they eat insects and larvae
- ⇒ their feather colour is black
- ⇒ their leg colour is brown, orange and red
- ⇒ their beak is orange, red, medium length, curved and has medium thickness
- ⇒ their natural habitat is farmland and marine areas
- ⇒ females lay 3 to 5 eggs in April



#### **Puffins**

- $\Rightarrow$  puffins eat fish especially sand eels
- $\Rightarrow$  they are 26cm to 29cm in length
- ⇒ their wing span is 47cm to 63cm
- ⇒ their weight is 320g to 480g
- $\Rightarrow$  the population of puffins is around 580,000 pairs globally
- ⇒ puffins are Cornish! (though they can be found in other places)
- ⇒ puffins have a black and white feathery body and a multi-coloured beak including blue, white, orange and yellow
- ⇒ a puffin's beak changes colour during the year
- ⇒ puffins are nicknamed "sea parrots"
- ⇒ puffins spend most of their lives out at sea, resting on the waves when not swimming

and bookmarks...






...all from Class 1!
