towers immediately and save the city! You will need: newspaper, sellotape.






Superheroes in Choughs

After this devil dude targeted the city's bridges last week, the Choughs built reinforced paper structures made stronger by folding. This week, they needed to rise to the challenge of constructing the tallest tower they could using the

power of triangles! We looked at examples of how engineers use triangles in construction to make structures stronger and more stable. We then put this

into practice on our own team towers!



The Iron Man Falls...

Puffins have been exploring different writing features this week including repetition for effect and short snappy sentences in contrast with longer sentences beginning with subordinating conjunctions. We have thought

about how we can successfully use onomatopoeia and how brackets can help us share the emotions of a character.

We have tried these skills out in a retelling of the moment the Iron Man (by Ted Hughes) falls down the cliff...

A lullaby of starlings lured him closer. A melody of the sea beckoned him to join. A tune of the gale sung to make him come.

Falling, crashing, toppling, descending down, down, down. Crash! Scrape! Bang!

Ledge to ledge the Iron Man dived. Wall to wall, pebble to pebble, crag to crag, he plunged and crashed.

Then the last little fragment of the Iron Man fell. Tink.

Peace. Silence. Nothing.

As the Iron Man opened his eyes, he saw crabs scuttling across the dark and lonely beach; he wished he could too. He heard the sea lapping up against the rocks coming closer and closer to his broken body parts.

He realised (to his shock) that he had broken into many different parts. He was shocked.



Maths Club 1 - Doubling

Maths club started this week - have a look at the puzzle posed.



Puss in Boots earns money by catching rabbits and selling them to the King.

The King pays Puss in Boots £100 for each rabbit.

 \pounds 1 is the same as one hundred 1p coins (as you know, there are 100 pennies in a pound).

So if the King paid Puss in Boots in pennies then each rabbit would cost:

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\pounds 100 \times 100 (pennies in a pound) = 10,000 pennies.
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That is a lot of 1p coins!

Now Puss in Boots is good at Maths and he offers the King a different way to pay him for this rabbit.

"Your Majesty, instead of paying me 10,000 pennies for this rabbit, I ask for 1 pence on the first square of this chessboard, then 2 pence on the second square, four pence on the third square then 8 pence and so on, doubling the number of pence each time until all 64 squares are filled", said Puss in Boots.

Now the King is not very good at Maths and summons you to give him advice on how he should pay Puss in Boots.

Will the King pay less than 10,000 pennies for the rabbit if he puts money on the chessboard instead?
